


so hard to provide experiences beyond the classroom for our students. It is their dedication and commitment that makes our school such a wonderful place for students to learn and grow.

What are you thinking?

We have between 12-60,000 thoughts a DAY. This is 2,500 thoughts each hour or 42 thoughts each minute.

85% of these are negative

"I can't do this" "I look silly" "I'm not good enough" 95% of these thoughts are repetitive thoughts from the previous day "I can't do this" "I look silly" "I'm not good enough"

Thoughts, feelings and behaviours are connected. It is our thoughts that create our feelings which influence our behaviours.

Our mind can be the biggest challenge and obstacle, yet we create these for ourselves with our thoughts. You will never speak to anyone more than you speak to yourself in your head. Be kind to yourself.

Practice on focusing on creating positive thoughts.

If we consciously catch a negative thought and say the opposite of what's in our head (even out loud) - "I can do this, I'm great, I'm good enough".

OR

If we commit to a small change in our behaviour we will challenge negative self-talk, create new patterns of thinking and feeling in our brain, encouraging belief and possibility for ourselves.

Beautifully decorated by our year ten boys Tyler and Liam. Splendid job boys! They tasted as good as they looked.







During Year 10 Religious Education in Term 1, we focused on practical ways that people participate in God's creations from social justice to sustainability to appreciation of creation. Students had some great ideas and there were some really fantastic class discussions.

Term 1 is also the time where we celebrate the most important time of year for Catholics - Easter.

On Ash Wednesday, the school held a liturgy to commemorate the beginning of Lent and the 40 days leading up to Easter. Our Groundsman Matthew facilitated the liturgy and many students and staff took part in receiving ashes.

During the liturgy, we heard a passage from the Gospel where Jesus reminds us that change is not for show or to gain approval from others. We live in a world of attention seekers who constantly seek approval from others to feel better about themselves.

Matthew reminded us that change comes from inside of us and Lent reminds us that we need to think deeper about our lives and what we can do for others.

He challenged us to, instead of giving something up for Lent (as many people do), try and do something nice for each of the 40 days leading up to Easter. It could be something as simple as holding a door open for someone or telling someone they look nice today, to cooking a meal for your family or spending time with someone you don't see often. You could donate that change

in your pocket to Project Compassion or even pick up a piece of rubbish as you walk to school.

Be the positive change you want to see in the World.
